

1. I have clearly identified a client
 - a. RPG styled Dungeon Masters, Novel Writers looking for inspiration, RPG players looking for inspiration for their character bio

Teacher Note: an identified client is **one CLEAR person**. They might work for a company but your client is one person. I do think this client people are interesting but this isn't specific enough.

2. I have described an appropriate scenario for investigation for an identified client
 - a. If anyone is searching phrases like RPG, Character generator, Name generator, Story generator, Character story, inspiration for writing etc.

Teacher Note: without a very clear client, how can you know what the very clear problem is? What **HIGHLY** specific problem are you trying to solve here?

3. I have provided evidence of consultation
 - a. The client puts in some initial/essential information that he needs in his story

Teacher Note: about 10 emails, back and forth which describe the clear path to understanding a client requirements.

4. I have justified the rationale for choosing the proposed product

Teacher Note: How will your solution solve the problem you want to solve?

- a. This generator was made by a RPG player and also a novel-writer-wannabe so it definitely has all that you need
5. I have included a range of appropriate criteria for evaluating the success of the product

Teacher Note: This is pretty good. It clearly describes what this product must do to satisfy the success criteria.

- a. My system will create a rpg background generator
- b. My system will ask the user what genre they want
- c. My system will give five sentence background for a character
 - i. My program will ask a user what genre they want to build a character for. The choices will be: scifi, fantasy, and steampunk
 - ii. The first sentence will cover appearance
 - iii. The second sentence will cover [personality traits](#)
 - iv. The third sentence will cover early life (first 12 years)
 - v. The fourth sentence will cover goals and ambitions
 - vi. The fifth sentence will discuss flaws, scars, vendettas, and regrets
